



We then provided five concerts before Christmas, two of which were at the Alberta Health Services (AHS) Fanning centre, continuing our presence there for a number of years. Masking was required at the Fanning Centre and hopefully that will be the last time for that.

January through March saw us providing songs and occasionally the haggis ceremony at ten venues including our own Burns Dinner where we had a full complement of 24 singers participating. Practicing continues every Saturday morning at the Danish Canadian Club.

COVID and the 2022 Calgary Burns Club Singers Tour



In the late summer of 2022 sixteen members of the Calgary Burns Club (CBC) Singers, almost all of whom were over the age of 60 and most were older than 70, travelled to Scotland to tour and perform in the south-west in Burns Country. This was a trip planned for the summer of 2020, but cancelled because of the COVID 19 pandemic.

All participants knew that the pandemic was not over and undertook the trip aware of the risks involved. All were fully vaccinated and most had 2 booster doses of vaccine. The weather was unusually warm for the time of year and the concert schedule was rigorous.

What follows is an observational study of the trip:

- * Nine members had developed COVID within 6 months prior to the trip.
- * One member, who travelled to Scotland before the main group, contracted the disease shortly after arrival and had recovered prior to the rest of the group arriving.
- * Four members contracted COVID towards the end of the tour, with the contact point likely traced to a venue in a poorly ventilated room, in which 50 60 people were in attendance.
- * Other individuals in the audience at this event also contracted the disease.
- * Eight group members travelled with their partners. Two partners contracted it with their significant other, and one contracted it even though their partner did not.
- * The Singers who contracted COVID noticed the onset of the symptoms 2–3 days following the event. One member developed symptoms on the flight back 2 days after their exposure and tested positive the following day at their home using the rapid antigen test.
- * The three remaining members who contracted it, did so in Scotland and self-isolated in their hotels. The self-isolation regime was between 5 and 10 days. They too tested positive using the rapid antigen test.
- * Most described their symptoms as mild to moderate. Only one person consulted a physician, and none took any anti-viral medications.
- * It is interesting to note that only one of the nine members who had previously suffered from COVID contracted it on the trip. This person (fully vaccinated) has now had 3 documented COVID infections.
- * Two of the nine shared a room with someone who contracted it on the trip, but did not themselves contract it. Four people were selected for random testing at the airport on arrival back in Canada and none tested positive. Two of these had contracted COVID on the trip but had recovered prior to their return.

What is suggested from this analysis?

- * Although not laboratory proven, this was almost certainly a variant of Omicron.
- * The venue at which the exposure took place can be identified.
- * The incubation period appears to be 2 ¹/₂ to 3 days, in agreement with what is known about this variant.
- The disease was subjectively reported as mild to moderate, and no one was admitted to hospital.
- * It appears that vaccination with boosters is beneficial, but an episode of the disease also provides some natural immunity, especially when exposed to the virus at a high-risk event.

JIM HOPE-ROSS (CHARLIE MALONE)

Jim Hope-Ross has been with the Club for what is nearing twenty-five years, and is one of our Life Members, due to his extensive contributions to the Club. He has during this time been President of the Club, held several positions on the Board and has actively participated in a number of committees.

He continues to provide legal counsel advice to the Board, and has been pivotal in coaching and advising the Board on what defines good Governance.

Jim continues to be a very active member of the Club as an ever present member of the Singers, and has had the fortune of attending the Singers tours to Scotland in 2009, and more recently in 2022. We asked Jim if he could tell his life story in his own words, and he kindly offered:

"Why Alberta takes kids who are in the angst of puberty and places them in segregation in junior high for three years is beyond me. I attended 4 schools in those 3 years. Then in high school, my lack of interest or ambition landed me on the Laggard List. The school's guidance counselor told my parents: "*That son of yours isn't going to amount to much. You should pull him out of school right now and get him to work digging ditches.*" Within days, I was packed off to a Saskatchewan boarding school.

Five years later, when I graduated from the University of Saskatchewan (U of S) with a B.A. in English and a Bachelor of Laws degree, my mother clipped the announcement of my convocation out of the newspaper and mailed it to that guidance counselor. I was called to the Alberta Bar just shy of my 25th birthday.

Fast forward 10 years. I was General Counsel of BP Exploration, but I found myself at a crossroads. You see, I was always a big fan of the Canadian Football League (CFL). I played high school and university football, but I was too small to play beyond that. My Dad was none too pleased when I became a lawyer instead of an engineer. But since that was what I was, his ambition for me was to reach the pinnacle of that profession, which in his eyes, meant becoming the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada. Not a chance! Top judges in Canada would have to be bilingual. I had obtained the unbelievable grade of 7% (Seven percent!) in French in the second semester of my Grade 12 year.

But the Commissioner of the CFL (G. Sydney Halter), was both a lawyer and a referee. Attaining that position would be my goal. I set about to become the best CFL official. I worked my way up the amateur ranks to the point where I was the standby official for pro games in Calgary. An official was injured during a game and I went in as his replacement. The next year, I was invited to the CFL's officials' school where I wrote the rules exam receiving a mark of 100%, and was invited into the league. Just one small hurdle. No one makes a living by refereeing football. I had to have my employer's permission. The President of the company said it would be out of the question. They couldn't have their head legal counsel "running around the country playing football". I resigned from the company and set up my own law firm.

Coincidentally, Imperial Oil ("ESSO") had filed its application with the Alberta Energy Resources and Conservation Board ("AERCB") to build its mega heavy oil project in the Cold Lake region of Northeast Alberta. There were no regulations surrounding intervention into such an application and no intervenor funding in place to support those folks raising their concerns. The AERCB hired me to act for all the local and regional intervenors at the hearing into the project. I had the necessary regulatory knowledge and experience and being a new law firm, I would have the time necessary to mount a credible representation. I would be independent of any AERCB or ESSO influence, and the Board would be responsible for my fees and costs. By the time the hearing convened, I had 67 distinct clients or client groups. It was a grueling schedule. I would fly back to Calgary on those weekends when I wasn't refereeing football to babysit my fledgling law firm, and try to devote some precious time to my family. But thanks to the publicity, our practice began to flourish.

That fall, I became the first sophomore official to work a Grey Cup game. But storm clouds showed on the horizon. (Continued on Page 10)

Jim Speaking at the Calgary Burns Club Annual Banquet The Federal government introduced its infamous National Energy Program (NEP). Within six months, my firm had lost 60% of our oil & gas clients. The support staff quit to find more stable employment and benefits with larger corporations. My law partner went to work for PanCanadian Petroleum (the CPR's oil & gas subsidiary).

My wife ran off with the veterinarian, and took the horses, leaving me with the acreage, the three boys, and the two dogs. But I had attained the position of Head Referee with my own assigned crew of officials in the CFL. One game, a journalist featured me as a human-interest story. The story took up a full page, complete with a photograph. The next day my ex-wife called me to ask: "So tell me, Jim, what's it cost to run a full-page ad in the Calgary Herald?"

About that time, the General Counsel at Pan-Canadian chose to retire. My former partner was the second -in-command in their law department. He asked if I would be interested in being his boss again and said he would recommend me for the job. Once again good fortune had shone upon me, and continued to shine upon me when I met the administrative assistant to the Vice President of Exploration - a dark-eyed Scottish lass, who was as bright as she was beautiful. My sons adored her, particularly my youngest son, Jeff, who was only four years old when he met Sandra.

Sandra had planned a trip back to Scotland with a girlfriend and she regarded it as a bucket-list adventure, so my sons and I were put on "*hold*" while she went off, as I put it, "*to scramble our nest egg*". We knew that the company would frown upon both of us being employees of the company once we were married. While she was away, I had scouted out a contract to take on the role of Associate General Counsel to the President of Petro-Canada Resources.

Sandra never went back to work. I never refereed another football game. (Although I did fulfill that ambitious plan after a fashion. I was invited to apply for the Commissioner's job and went to Toronto for an interview. When I learned that the league was rife with politics and the position had very little power and was committed to staying in Toronto, I said, "*No thanks!*")

After 11 years in Petro-Canada colours, I had built a formidable team of oil & gas lawyers. Through judicious use of delegation and mentoring, any function that I might contribute could be capably provided by one or more of my team members. When I was asked who in my group could be expendable in the next round of corporate cuts, I put my hand up. I had the right number of years of service and age to qualify for early retirement, which I took, along with an enhanced severance package. Fittingly, I was never replaced.

Shortly thereafter, Canadian Occidental Petroleum (Cdn Oxy) asked me to join its law department, primarily to assist with their acquisitions initiatives. The target was Wascana Energy, a Saskatchewan Crown Corporation. My background as a born-and-raised "stubble-jumper" with a U of S law degree, and an affinity for the province contributed to my suitability for the task. Initially, my role was to assist the team with their due diligence.

One of the first things I came upon was the Wascana Energy Act, which created the company, and set out its terms of governance and reporting relationships with the province's politicians and bureaucrats. Chief among those was the requirement that the head office of Wascana Energy had to be in Saskatchewan.

I was asked to move to Regina with responsibility for "showing the flag" in the community, maintaining relations with the government folks, and providing legal counsel with respect to the ongoing business of Wascana Energy. My unwritten, but ultimate goal would be to have the Wascana Energy Act repealed.

Not long after the close of the purchase, heavy oil prices dropped significantly. I was summoned to Calgary and asked what the penalties were if Cdn Oxy just ignored the Wascana Energy Act and closed the Regina office and moved all the operations to Calgary's head office. I advised that there were no "penalties", per se, but the law is the law and I, as their lawyer, could not advise the company to break the law just because the Act did not impose penalties. CdnOxy said they were going to do it anyway, so I was forced to resign.

We stayed on in Regina until the end of Alicia's school term and then were relocated back to our old neighborhood in Calgary where I have remained ever since.

I have done work with Indigenous peoples throughout Canada and the North and have taught good governance across all 11 time zones of Russia, but space does not allow me to discuss those adventures here!

PARTING GLASS (TREKKER ARMSTRONG)

So how does the song Parting Glass relate to Burns and the Armstrong Reivers?

"*The Parting Glass*" is a traditional Scottish song, often sung at the end of a gathering of friends. It has also long been sung in Ireland, enjoying considerable popularity to this day, and strongly influencing the style in which it is often now sung. It was purportedly the most popular parting song sung in Scotland before Robert Burns wrote "*Auld Lang Syne*".

So, what is another name for a Parting Glass?

The "*parting glass*", or "*stirrup cup*", was the final hospitality offered to a departing guest. Once they had mounted, they were presented one final drink to fortify them for their travels. This custom was practised in several countries. I guess we now know where "*one for the road*" originated from.

The earliest known printed version of the song was as a broadside in the 1770s, and it first appeared in book form in Ancient and Modern Scottish Songs, Heroic Ballads. An early version is sometimes attributed to Sir Alex Boswell. The text is doubtless older, as it was recorded in the Skene Manuscript, a collection of Scottish airs written at various dates between 1615 and 1635.

It was known at least as early as 1605, when a portion of the first stanza was written in a farewell letter, as a poem now known as "*Armstrong's Goodnight*", by one of the Border Reivers executed that year for the murder of a Warden of the Scottish March. Sir John Carmichael was killed by a body of the Armstrong's Reivers on June 16, 1600, who ambushed and shot him as he rode to Langholm to attend a warden court. For this murder Thomas Armstrong, nephew of Kinmont Willie was executed in the following November, and Alexander Armstrong in February 1606.

According to Sir Walter Scott, tradition affirms the well-known ballad, "*Armstrong's Good Night*" to have been composed by Thomas Armstrong, before his execution.

I first came across the poem "*Armstrong's Goodnight*" having purchased an 1830 publication by Sir Walter Scott of the Minstrelsy of the Scottish Border. This three- volume set was an anthology of Border ballads that was first published in 1802 but was expanded in several later editions. For Walter Scott, as his son-in-law J. G. Lockhart later wrote, compiling Minstrelsy of the Scottish Border was "a *labour of love truly, if ever such there was*".

His passion for ballads went back to early childhood where as a ten-year-old he began collecting the broadsheet ballads that were still being sold on the streets. In late 1799, impressed by the elegant work of the Kelso printer James Ballantyne, an old schoolfellow of his, the idea occurred to him of putting together a selection of ballads to be printed by him. This would satisfy his patriotic feelings in various ways, not just displaying the typographical prowess of a little-known Border town, but also preserving the folk-poetry of his beloved Scotland for the admiration of the world at large.

Excerpt from Minstrelsy of the Scottish Border

The following verses are said to have been composed by one of the Armstrongs, executed for the murder of Sir John Carmichael of Edrom, warden of the middle marches. The tune is popular in Scotland; but whether these are the original words, is still in doubt:

Armstrong's Goodnight

"This night is my departing night, For here nae langer must I stay; There's neither friend nor foe o' mine, But wishes me away.

What I have done thro' lack of wit, I never, never, can recall; I hope ye're a' my friends as yet; Goodnight and joy be with you all! "

How Prolific Was Robert Burns as a Poet

Robert Burns enjoyed a very short life, having succumbed to a degenerative heart condition at only thirtyseven-and-a-half years of age. Although he wrote his first published poem in his fifteenth year - *Handsome Nell* - he composed only a very few others until approaching twenty. Thereafter, he produced more than six hundred poems and songs; in a modern volume of his works, those fill close to the same number of pages. That's prolific! Especially given that from an early age most of his waking hours were spent in backbreaking farm work, and later in life, riding most of the day performing his duties as an Excise Officer.

Any deserving poetical piece calls for considerable thought, driven as it usually is by deep feelings, convictions, and emotions, among other innate motivators. We know little about how speedy he was in composing and reviewing each piece, but we do know that he was possessed of a brilliant mind, and by nature was intense and passionate. No doubt these gifts and characteristics would have been essential to his success in earning the well-deserved accolade of Scotland's Immortal Bard. That title is a tribute less to the volume of poems and songs he produced, but to the quality and thematic scope of his works.

First and foremost, he was a poet of Nature. His knowledge of Ayrshire's fauna and flora was encyclopedic. How he embraced it, even using it often to garnish descriptions of his '*fair enslavers*' and other subjects. His descriptions of 'nature most fair' are so touching and uplifting. These may be contrasted with his earnest concern for the defenceless creatures that were exposed to man's cruelty, as in *On Seeing a Wounded Hare*, and even the 'wee mousie' who's 'wee-bit housie' he inadvertently left in ruin.

As a close second, he was the poet of Love. Even in his time, but more so shortly after his death, many condemned him for the many lovers that he had, and his out-of-wedlock 'begats', but we can thank those experiences for the depth of genuine feelings reflected in so many wonderful and endearing love poems and songs - such as *Ae Fond Kiss*, which I believe rates very close to being the most touching love song in English literature.

I could go on for some time highlighting other themes at which our brilliant bard excelled, but I will mention just a few, beginning with his satirical pieces. *Holy Willie's Prayer*, much like his world-class love song noted above, must surely rate as a classical masterpiece of rhyme incorporating, as it does, such scorching - yet oh so amusing - satire. He often employed similar satirical diatribe to rebuke some of the bible-thumping, 'rigidly righteous' Ministers he encountered, most of whom he exposed as hypocrites. Then we have his championing of the poor and the oppressed...so many pieces on that theme crying out for justice and equality; *A Man's a Man for A' That* could well be adopted as the international anthem for the ordinary citizens often deprived and made subservient to the ruling classes, although probably even <u>more</u> pertinent to the masses in Burns's time than now.

In conclusion, Scotland's Bard is close to being unique in world literature, not only for his impressive output of exceptional poetry, but also for the scope of important life themes that he addressed in his works. He was a genius, yes, and prolific, but he also had the talent to reach into the soul and touch on so many concerns and feelings of mankind...the agonies and the ecstasies to which we are all subjected.

EPITAPHS FROM ALL SEASONS (STEPHEN NICHOL)

An epitaph is an inscription on a tomb or tombstone, relating to the person buried there, or an item of prose or verse telling something of a person, and to be displayed after he/she dies.

It must be short; it can be written by anyone; often for himself by the person who dies (The meaning is funeral oration)

In Greek times, around 480 BC, the Persians were marching on the Greek city of Sparta and a group of Spartans met and engaged the aggressors at Thermopylae where nearly all of the defending force were killed. One managed to escape and rode back to warn the city of the impending invasion. A relief force was gathered and rallied to the battle at the cost of the many lives.

The Spartans later erected a monument in memory of the 300 Spartans, which used the words by the Greek Poet **Simonides**:

"O passer-by Tell the Lacedaemonians That We Lie Here, Obeying Their Orders"

William Shakespeare (1564 – 1616) is believed to have written the following epitaph: "Good friend for Jesus sake forbeare To dig the dust enclosed here Blessed be the man that spares these stones, And cursed be he that moves my bones." re was buried in his local parish at Holy Trinity Church in Stratford, upon Avon's At the

Shakespeare was buried in his local parish at Holy Trinity Church in Stratford- upon-Avon's . At the time of Shakespeare's death grave-robbing and relic-hunting was popular and Shakespeare's epitaph comes across as a curse and a warning to those who might have looted his gravesite.

Samuel Taylor Coleridge (1772 -1834) wrote his epitaph 9th November, 1833 which catches his preoccupation with the Christian promise of life beyond death: "Stop, Christian passer-by! Stop, child of God, and read with gentle breast. Beneath this sod a poet lies, or that which once seemed he. O lift one thought in prayer for S.T.C.; That he who many a year with toil of breath Found death in life, may here find life in death! Mercy for praise; to be forgiven for fame He asked, and hoped, through Christ. Do thou the same!"

Robert Burns (1759- 1796) wrote many poems, songs and epitaphs during his 37 year life. To have had Robert Burns write an epitaph for anybody would be something to be treasured given the fame that Burns has gained during his life and in the time that has passed since he died. In 1788 the epitaph that Burns wrote for his friend Willie Nicol captures the relationship that he shared with Nicol:


> "Ye maggots, feed on Nicol's brain, For few sic feasts you've gotten; And fix your claws in Nicol's heart, For deil a bit o't's rotten."

Rudyard Kipling (1895-1936) was a commentator on the events around WWI and he noted the practice of executing soldiers deemed to be cowards but today it is understood these were men suffering from shell-shock. Kipling wrote an epitaph for these WWI soldiers which he called "The Coward":

"I could not look on death, which being known, Men lead me to him, blindfold and alone."

Robert Louis Stevenson (1850-1894) suffered from the effects of Scotland's climate and to help his weakness and save him from ill health he travelled to the Pacific. There he counted on living in a warmer climate and that would help him escape from the effects of Scotland's cool damp climate. Stevenson wrote an Epitaph for himself:





EPITAPHS FROM ALL SEASONS (CONTINUED)

This is the epitaph at Stephenson's grave, on his gravestone, at Vailima, Samoa.

"Here he lies where he longed to be Under the wide and starry sky Dig the grave and let me lie Glad did I live and gladly die And I laid me down with a will This be the verse you grave for me; Here he lies where he long to be Home is the sailor, home from the sea And the hunter, home from the hill.

Edith Cavell (1865-1915) was executed by a German firing squad in Belgium for assisting British WWI soldiers, who were patients at Cavell's hospital, to return to England and escape imprisonment in a German POW camp.

As Edith Cavell was waiting for the death sentence to be carried out one of her last visitors spoke with her and heard her say:

"Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone".

In the Canadian Rockies Edith Cavell has another memorial in her name, a peak that is known as Mount Edith Cavell within Jasper National Park.

Of all the epitaphs I have seen, there is one that stands apart from all the others as the most haunting. This was the cruel words used by the WW2 nazis at the entrance to many of the German concentration camps. In German these words were: "Arbeit macht freu" and which in English is:

"Work sets you free! "

These words are a cynical epitaph for victims of the nazis regime that defines the 19th century and burdens and reminds the generation that have followed since, of the price paid for Nazis domination.

Charles Lindbergh (1902-1974), the famous United States aviator used a quote from the bible as his epitaph.

" If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea" Lindburgh died of Lymphoma and is buried within the sound of the sea at the Palapala Ho'Omau Cemetery; Kipahulu, Maui, Hawaii.


