


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CANADA 150 YEARS (TREKKER ARMSTRONG)

Canada's 150 Anniversary of Confederation The Calgary Burns Club, is exploring the opportunity to bring Calgary's Scottish community together in 2017 to celebrate Canada's 150 Anniversary and our contribution to Confederation.

Of the thirty-six original fathers of Confederation, more than half were Scottish Canadians. "Canada's existence as an independent state in North America, a nation apart from the American super power, is a balancing act that owes much to a Scottish sense of the possible, the Scottish style of management and their own long history of living in the lee of a great power." *

The Calgary Burns Club is in discussions with Fort Calgary regarding participating in their Canada day celebration. We believe it would be an ideal venue for the broader Scottish Associations of Calgary to participate in, given the connection with Calgary House from the Isle of Mull, Scotland. We don't have a specific proposal at this time, but are evaluating options with Fort Calgary.

Stephen Nichol, Director at Large, has taken on the accountability to pursue this further.

THE CARNIE GROUP (RON BUDD/TONY GRACE)

This group meets once a month to discuss Scottish literature for the period roughly between 1700 and 1850. Our purpose is for members of the group to expand their knowledge about this subject both for their own benefit and interest, but also through presentations for our members at the Club meetings. Obviously the prime focus is on the life and works of Burns and to this end a number of presentations have been made about Burns' life but also on some of his friends and acquaintances such as David Sillar and Highland Mary. Each meeting we look at one of Burns poems or letters and discuss the purpose of the work as well as understanding how it came to be written and including a commentary on the people involved.

There is much research done by individuals to produce each paper/presentation and they are usually longer and more detailed than can be accommodated in the limited time available at Club meetings. Presentations are aimed to be completed in fifteen minutes or just a little longer, but the full version is posted on the Club website which members can access on their own time. It is interesting to note that the papers on the website are regularly and frequently looked out by individuals across the world.

The group does not limit itself to Burns but looks at and researches the lives and works of other poets and writers. Some of these may have personally known Burns or his works and may have been influenced by such. This year we have looked at Highland Mary and where she fitted into Burns' life and what her true story was. There was also a discussion on the poem Grim Grizzle 1795, and a paper on Burns as a poet of nature.

It needs to be remembered that we are a Burns Club and as such all members should have some appreciation and knowledge of the man and his works, and the Carnie Group hopes to not only add to that appreciation and knowledge through its presentations but to encourage the Club members to explore the works of Burns on their own — they will find it an enriching experience.

41ST ANNUAL BANQUET 2017 (TREKKER ARMSTRONG)

The Calgary Burns Club will be hosting its 41^{st} Annual Robert Burns Banquet on January 20^{th} , 2017 at the TELUS Convention Centre.

The Immortal Memory will be delivered by Willie Gibson, who will travel from Glasgow Scotland to join us on the Friday evening. His first introduction to Burns was at Secondary School, when the English teacher choose Willie to do the reading of A Mans A Man for A' That, which he later performed at the School Concert.

In his early 20s Willie moved to Coventry, where he joined the Tam O'Shanter Burns Club. When he moved to Polmont (near Falkirk) Willie joined the Higginsneuk Burns Club, where he was President for 3 years.

Willie is currently a member of the Prestwick Burns Club and a member of the Robert Burns World Federation, where he served on the Schools Committee with an involvement in the Local and National Competitions.

The Scottish Community perseveres the current economic hardship and attendance is trending towards last year's dinner numbers. The organizing committee has arranged for a block of rooms at the Marriot Hotel at a rate of \$154 per night. In addition, based on membership feedback, advance purchase of liquor tickets have been made available to members.

The Calgary Burns Club looks forward to a celebration of the life and poetry of the poet Robert Burns. We would like to remind the table hosts, that you are responsible for the behaviour of those seated at your table(s).



BURNS WORLD NEWS (TONY GRACE)


The Club is represented at the **Robert Burns Association of North America** by Tony Grace who is one of the Canadian Directors. This organization tries to co-ordinate knowledge and activities between Burns Clubs across North America, as well as the preservation and appreciation generally of the works, life and philosophies of Scotland's Robert Burns.

Currently some 28 Clubs are affiliated and there are a number of individual members as well.

RBANA hold an annual conference and in 2016 that was in Dallas and the Club was represented by Tony Grace. The 2017 Conference will be in Medicine Hat on April 28-30, 2017. Why don't you consider attending – applications and details are on the website www.rbana.com.

The **Robert Burns World Federation** has just issued the 2017 Burns Chronicle, an annual publication with articles concerning anything to do with Robert Burns. Copies are available through the Club and if you would like one (about \$40) contact Jamie Osborne. The Federation is in the process of digitizing all the past issues of the Chronicle (started in 1892), which are available at no cost on line. Clubs and/or individuals are asked to sponsor the digitizing of a single volume at the cost of GBP50. Once complete there will be an incredible resource available online to check out many aspects of Burns, all triggered by a keyword choice.

As with RBANA, the Federation holds an annual AGM and Conference which in 2017 will be held at Peebles in the Borders of Scotland from September $8-10^{\text{th}}$. In the last few years the Calgary Club has been well represented at these conferences and it would be good if that can continue.

PORRIDGE RECIPE

(SUBMITTED BY STEPHEN NICHOL)

Porridge for Healthy Living (A Holy Dish for Lapsed Christians)

This is a hearty breakfast that will carry you through to lunch. Makes one/two servings.

Ingredients

1/3 cup (quick cooking) rolled oats; add a pinch of salt

1/3 cupsultanas/dried cranberries; soaked in one cup water over night
